

### National Strategic Policing Priorities 2010/11

- Continue to increase public confidence so that by March 2012, 60% of the public agree that the police and local council are dealing with the anti-social behaviour and crime issues that matter in their local communities
- Reduce and prevent crime and anti-social behaviour and help tackle youth offending and the problems caused by drug and alcohol misuse, in line with Public Service Agreements 14, 23 and 25, and in a coordinated approach with other CJS partners deliver an effective criminal justice response in line with Public Service Agreements 24, putting the needs of victims, including young victims, at its heart
- Work jointly with police forces and other agencies, such as SOCA and UKBA (UK Borders Agency), to ensure that the capability and capacity exists across England and Wales to deliver effective protective services, including tackling serious and organised crime
- Work with and through partners and local communities to tackle terrorism and violent extremism in line with the counter terrorism strategy (CONTEST) and Public Service Agreements 26.
- In all of the above, ensure that value for money is central to the strategic vision for improving policing; that best value is made of resources in line with the White Paper and the Efficiency and Productivity Strategy for the Police service, both within forces and through collaboration between forces and with the wider public sector; and that chief officers and senior leaders should be visibly associated with this organisational priority.

### Cambridgeshire Constabulary's Local Policing Priorities

- To ensure the best use of resources to deliver an efficient and effective service to achieve value for money
- To increase the trust and confidence of the public in the Constabulary and improve their satisfaction
- To deal with local policing issues, which are of concern to the public, reduce crime and anti-social behaviour
- To protect the public from serious crime and prevent people from being attracted to potential criminal activity.
